

Americans Across Political Parties Want the Federal Government to Require All Copay Assistance Be Applied Towards a Patient's Out-of-Pocket Costs

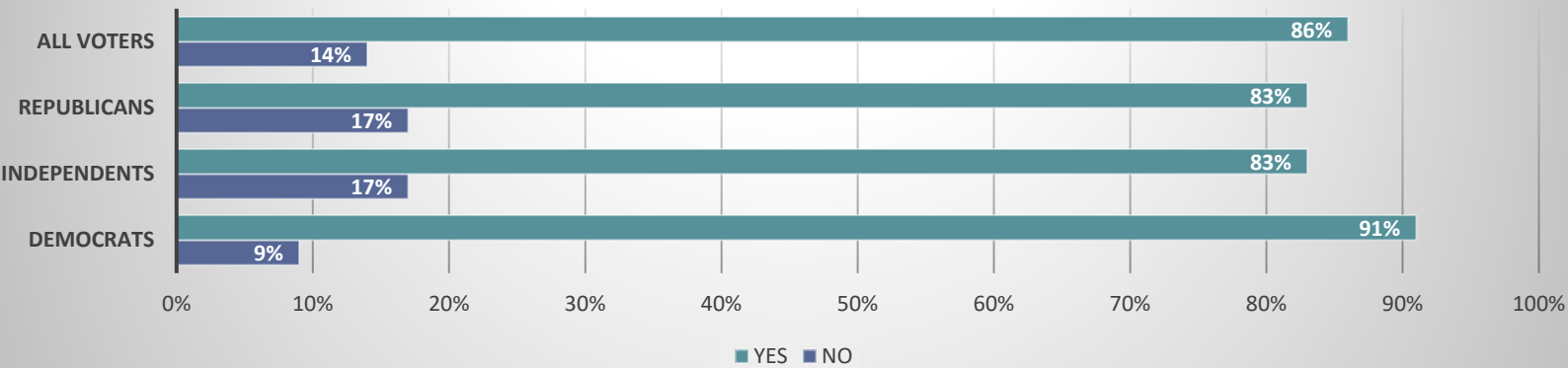


In October 2020, the National Hemophilia Foundation (NHF) released the findings of a national survey of registered voters fielded by the polling firm Public Opinion Strategies (POS), to gauge public sentiment on copay assistance programs and patient out-of-pocket costs.

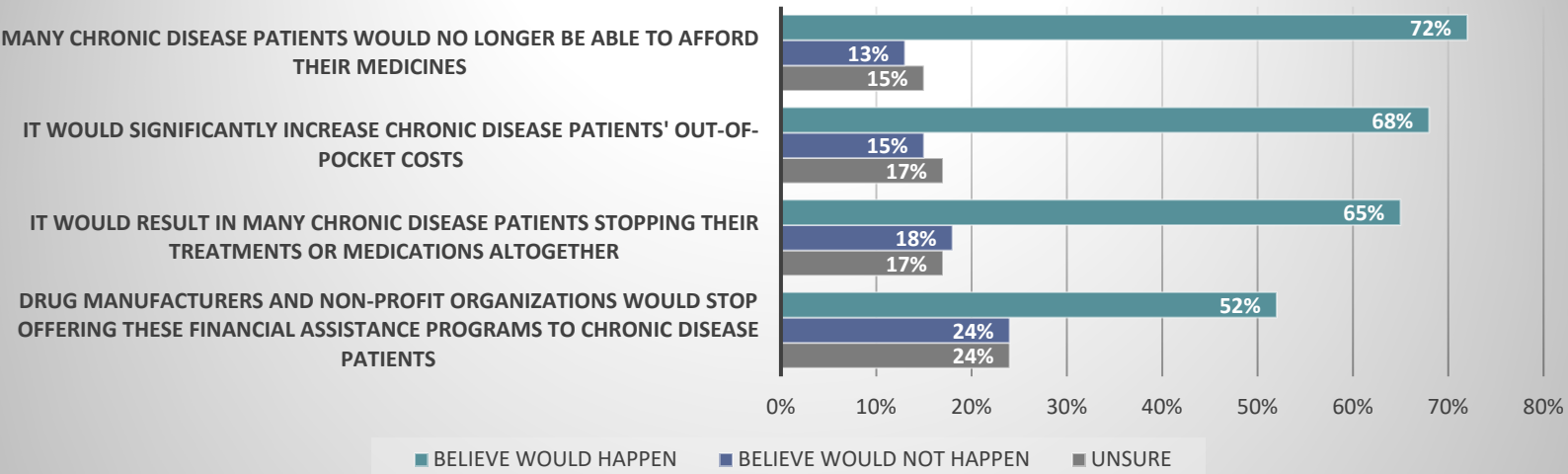
Three key findings emerged from the survey:

Finding #1: The Majority of Voters Across Political Parties Believe the Government Should Require Copay Assistance to Count Toward a Patient's Out-of-Pocket Costs.

Should the government require financial assistance to count towards patients' out-of-pocket costs?

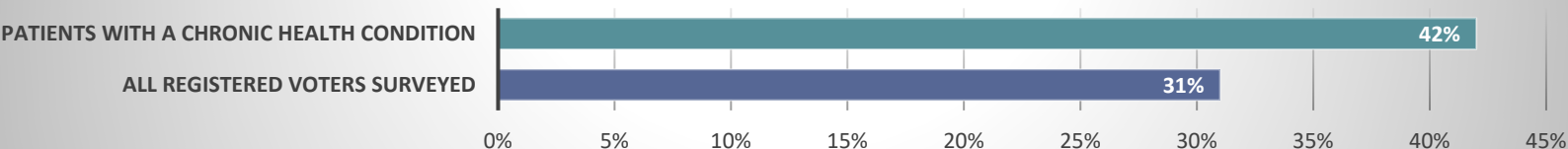


Finding #2: The Majority of Voters Believe There Would Be Significant Negative Consequences for Chronic Disease Patients if Copay Assistance Was Not Counted Toward Patients' Out-of-Pocket Costs.



Finding #3: More Than Four in Ten Voters with Chronic Health Conditions Say They or Someone in Their Household Has Not Been Able to Afford the Out-of-Pocket Costs of the Health Insurance Copay in the Past Year.
